'Breaking Together' - or - so, what if we cannot fix this?

The signs that all is not well with humanity and the living planet are all around. The past 12 months has shattered heat records around the globe for extremes of heat, an off-the-charts wildfire season has hit us in Canada, and disastrous extreme weather events are continuing unabated worldwide. Beyond the incalculable loss of human and other life, it is estimated that these losses add up to about \$16M/hr over the last 20 years, and 0.6% of GDP worldwide for 2023. In addition, inflation is persistent, authoritarianism and conflict are rising and deteriorating mental health in the face of a questionable future is the new epidemic.

What if, as well as doing what we can in the present, we look squarely in the face of what we have been collectively denying and avoiding - and come to accept that we are living in an era of collapse?

Following from the work of Jem Bendell and others, this series of conversations is intended to provide a place to develop our understanding of where we are, and to look at the individual and collective choices we have of how to respond in full possession of the truth of our dire predicament.

Coach and Facilitator Dr. Don Goodeve is hosting these conversations which are intended to provide a forum and support as we investigate ways of responding and being together, without avoiding the highly inconvenient truth that our current way of being in the world is in very serious trouble.

Old Growth Logging Continues on East Coast of Vancouver Island

This is just a reminder that Mosaic Forest Management is continuing to log high elevation old growth forests (250 to 500 year old) on the east coast of Vancouver Island from Victoria to just north of Campbell River. This land is actually owned by two pension plans the BC Pension Management Corporation (BCi) and the federal Public Service Pension Investment Board (PSP) and Mosaic only manages the forests. Mosaic's forestry mis-management is negatively impacting the biodiversity of these lands and our watersheds are drying up every summer. The Save Our Forests Team – Comox Valley (SOFT-CV) is continuing to pressure the pension plans to change their approach to forestry management and live up to their corporate Green Plans. If you are a pensioner, a resident of Vancouver Island or a concerned citizen you can help put pressure by writing letters to the pension plans or participating in a rally in Victoria planned for late January / early February.
